

A Message From Bob

Dedicated. Brave. Committed.

When I think about the incredible team of hospice professionals who represent Arbor Hospice, these words only skim the surface of the respect and admiration I have for them.

I've heard from so many of these "angels" – as our families often refer to them – that this difficult, yet rewarding work is more than

just a job. To them, it is a calling. Yet, I also recognize that their tireless devotion to meet the needs of our patients and families is incredibly stressful, and the demands of the job can burn out even the most passionate team member.

Last year, the NorthStar Care Community was awarded a \$500,000 grant from the Michigan Health Endowment Fund to conduct the first-ever research regarding worker burnout rates in the hospice and palliative care industry.

The first two phases of this five-phase study were completed last year, providing excellent insight for the development of tools and practices to help manage workplace stress. Participation has been exceptional, with 85% of all clinical staff (representing all disciplines) responding to the initial agency-wide survey.

Key findings included:

- 38% of clinical staff indicate that they experience **very good** professional fulfillment.
- 58% of clinical staff indicate they experience **some level** of work exhaustion.
- 34% of clinical staff indicate they are/have experiencing **burnout**.


Deeper insight into the factors impacting exhaustion or burnout were revealed during one-on-one interviews during phase two. These insights will inform the development of a variety of interventions to be tested across the organization later this year.

Entering the next phases of the study, we will continue to work closely with our research partners from Michigan State University, Duke University and Stanford University as we implement and assess these interventions, drawing datadriven conclusions that will improve employee retention here and across the hospice and palliative care industry.

The heart of our service rests in the health and well-being of our clinical staff. We are excited to be at the forefront with this research as the outcomes will only build on Arbor Hospice's legacy of providing comfort, peace and dignity at end of life.

A Trip of a Lifetime

Liam and his family were planning on attending the Royal Oak screening and were excited to be able to see the movie before its nationwide release. Little did the Fairbanks know that thanks to Arbor Hospice, Hospice of Michigan, The Jenna Kast Believe in Miracles Foundation and Sony Pictures, a once in a lifetime trip was being planned to attend the Los Angeles Red Carpet premiere for Jumanji: The Next Level.

Diagnosed with brain cancer at 16, Liam faced his disease with poise far beyond his years, never complaining, even on the toughest days. Despite the challenges and setbacks, the family has remained firmly focused on making the most out of every day and to "live, laugh and love" frequently.

When Liam's care team floated the idea of sending him and his family to Los Angeles, Liam's mom, Heather, couldn't imagine that he would have the stamina to travel. Liam had just been hospitalized with a debilitating infection and his nurses weren't sure if he was stable enough to attend the screening in Royal Oak, let alone fly across the country to California.

Fortunately, Liam recovered from the infection, and by his 19th birthday, he had regained enough strength and mobility that he did not need to rely on his wheelchair as much. Heather knew that the prospect of the trip gave Liam something to look forward to. So with the doctor's clearance, the planning for a red carpet adventure began, bringing together Liam's community of support to create a one-of-a-kind trip.

The first surprise was a personalized video message from Dwyane "The Rock" Johnson and Kevin Hart expressing their excitement of Liam's participation at the premiere. Next, was a fitting for a new suit to wear at the premiere, thanks to the generosity of a long-time donor.

Beginning with a limousine ride to the airport, Liam, Heather and his younger brother Walker, set off on an epic California adventure.



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Finding Purpose After Loss

The impression the hospice experience makes on a family often has lasting impact, and in some cases, has opened the door to a new and fulfilling career path.

Social Worker - Tina Lamb's Story:

"My husband, Ken, was diagnosed with colon cancer in 2005. At the time, I was in school to obtain my associate's degree in teaching. Two years later, I proudly graduated and was grateful that my husband was able to see me walk across the stage and receive my degree.

During the summer of 2008, Ken's disease progressed and the cancer had metastasized to his brain. I was told by doctors that Ken had only two short months to live. That's when I decided to give him the best end-of-life experience and called Arbor Hospice.

Sadly, Ken passed away in November 2008, but his care team never left our side. The social worker continued to visit our home after Ken's death, encouraging me and our children, Emilie (21), Sara (12) and Jessica (11), the

opportunity to participate in support groups hosted by Arbor Hospice's grief care team.

During one of the visits with our social worker, I mentioned that I was planning to return to school to become a social worker because I was inspired by the dedication and commitment she showed our family. I wanted to help families during one of the hardest times in their lives and give them the support and guidance that our social worker gave to us.

In the fall of 2009, I took the leap, starting classes at Madonna University and earned my Bachelor's Degree in Social Work in 2012. I continued my education at Wayne State University, receiving my Master's Degree in Social Work in 2013. Soon after, I started my first job in child welfare, but quickly realized it was not where my heart was.

As fate would have it, I came across a job posting for a social worker at Arbor Hospice and eagerly, yet nervously applied for the position. I was excited when they called for an interview.

Amazingly, I was offered the position and accepted with great pleasure. When I called to accept, I tearfully remembered what I had told my social worker years before, "This is what I want to do. I want to do what you do," and it struck me... "here I am!"

Innovating and Expanding Caregiver Education

Introducing The Arbor Hospice Caregiver Resource Library

The responsibility of being a caregiver for a seriously ill loved one is both a great honor and an enormous undertaking. With the guidance of the Arbor Hospice care team, caregivers learn the skills necessary to help keep their loved one comfortable and focused on quality of life.

Because caregiving can be both physically and emotionally demanding, Arbor Hospice knows how important it is to provide resources that help caregivers be confident in this meaningful role.

That is why we are grateful for the generosity of a group of dedicated donors who have funded the production of a video series to reinforce the teaching our care teams provide caregivers during one-on-one visits.

The Caregiver Resource Library is accessible on www.arborhospice.org on a password–protected page.

It is designed with accessibility in mind, and acts as a reminder when a caregiver needs to refresh their knowledge of how to manage the most common pain and symptoms that patients experience at end of life.

The eight professionally produced videos are created to deliver information in an easy-to-understand format that guides them through the skills and techniques required to help keep their loved one comfortable. Some of the video topics include fall prevention, incontinence care, nausea and vomiting – to name a few.

Having this library readily available on a home computer, iPad or mobile phone will not replace one-on-one interactions with our patients and families, but will enhance the caregiver experience and quality of life for Arbor Hospice patients.

Our goal is to build and grow the *Caregiver Resource Library*, adding new topics so we can continue to help caregivers address the needs of their loved ones. Of course, to expand this video series, it requires funding from generous donors. The cost to film, edit and produce a video for the library is \$10,000.
